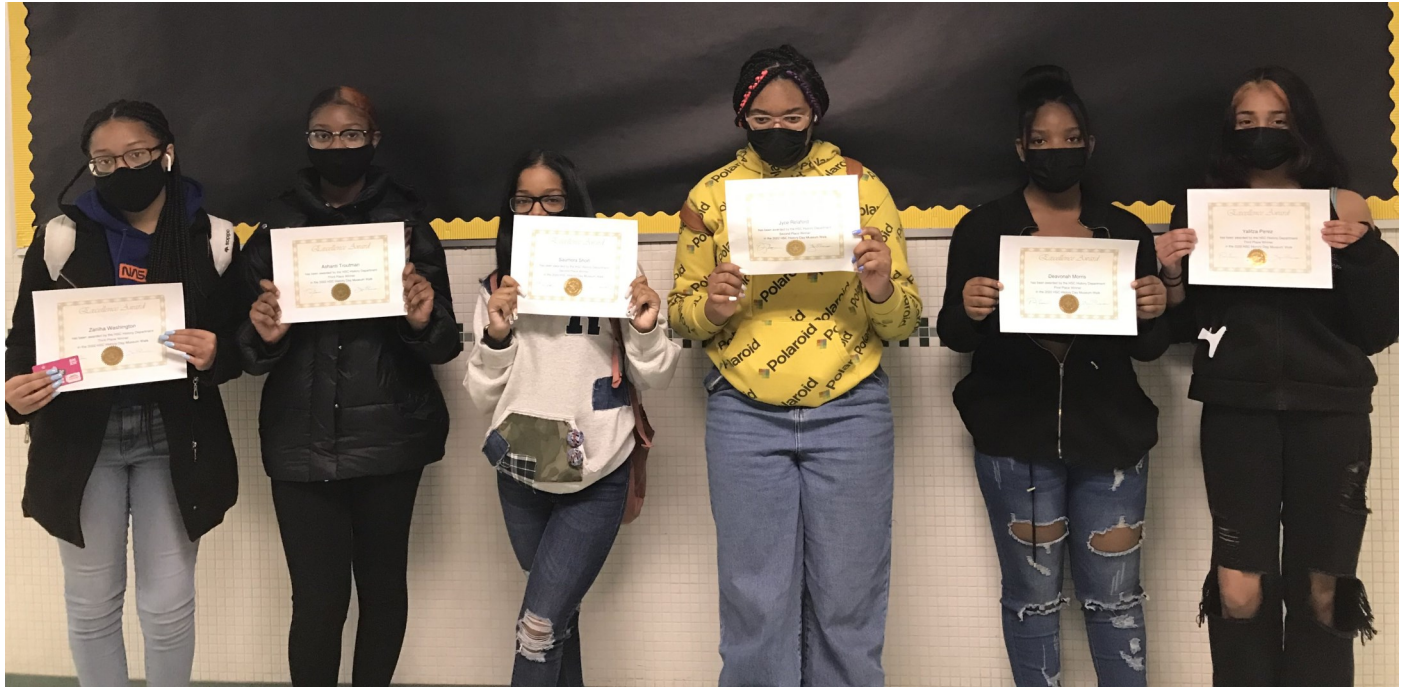
## Camp Hazen



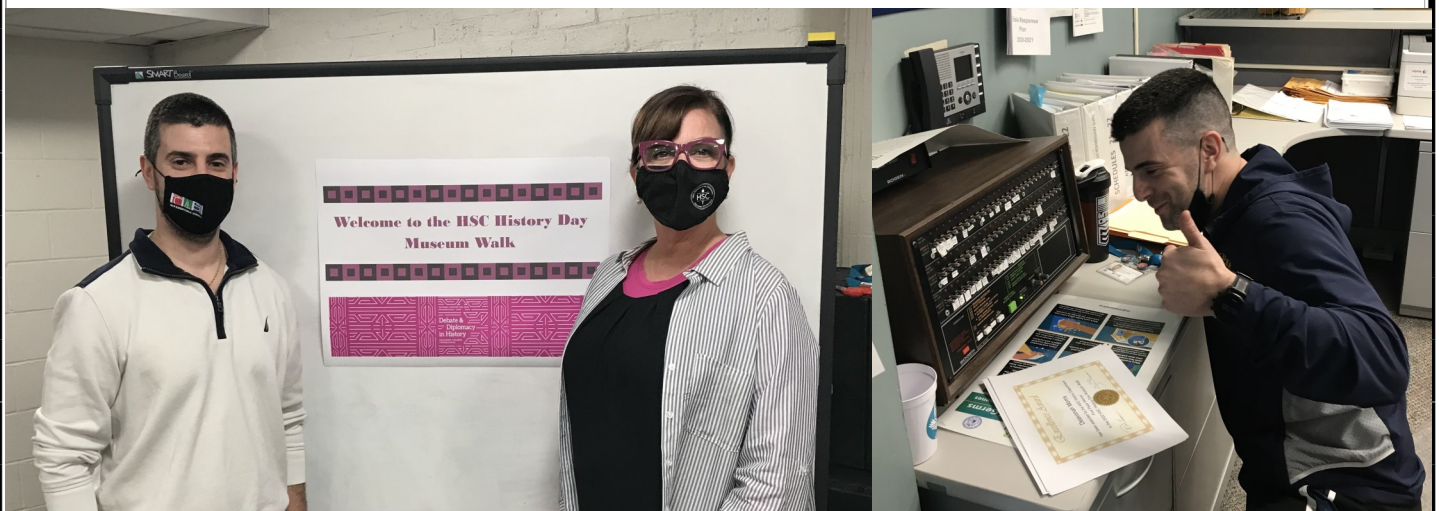
