021-22 Report from Director of Public Health Maritza Bond re: pandemic and masks	On the Motion by President Rivera, to amend the agenda to add a new item – motion Board of Education adopt the resolution, to continue the support of mask mandate order enacted by the City of New Haven seconded by Mr. Wilcox. Mr. Wilcox, yes; Mayor Elicker, yes; Dr. Benitez, yes; Dr. Yarborough, yes; Ms. Rivera, yes; Mr. Fiore, yes; Ms. Roman, yes. (passed). Director Bond gave an overview on COVID -19 situational awareness, variants of concern, CT DPH newly issued school guidance and the City of New Haven Executive Order. Further she elaborated on the City of New Haven recommendations. Positivity test rate at 2.5% and hospitalization is at 74% of ICU bed which give a downward trend from Omicron virus.

vaccination rate is in the lower percentage in the City of New Haven. In comparison to other surrounding cities we are ranking very low in similar age groups. She spoke on vaccination rates by age group by town. Vaccinations rate has been low in New Haven. Close surveillance and monitoring continue for the omicron BA2.I DPH is changing to a local community model to identify cases within our county and explore vaccination status and contingency plans for outbreaks etc. DPH continue to work with the Board of Education. Surveillance and monitoring efforts of other variants & their severity continues to be monitored.

Recommendations

Recommend continued with mask mandate to unforeseeable future due to:

- Low vaccination rate for age group 5-17 as compared to surrounding towns
- Significant percent of high-risk students in the district 40%
- Masks have been shown to be effective should there be another surge
- Ongoing Surveillance & Monitoring.

Attorney Antoinette

Attorney Antoinette also gave an overview of the framework for COVID-19 related mask mandate rules moving forward. The Special Acts 2022 -1 state that Boards of Education, municipalities and local health departments work together and consult when making these important decisions. The authority of the Commissioner of Education and the Commissioner of Early Childhood, in consultation with the Commissioner of Public Health, issued binding guidelines and rules for the operation of schools in relating to COVID-19. The State Department of Education and DPH retain that authority as they did under Executive Order 91 and Section 13 A. The new law prohibited those commissioners from rescinding the statewide mask mandate in schools prior to today. However, they no longer require universal masking at the statewide level effective today, but retained the authority to reinstitute their mask mandates at any point up until June 30th. Masks rules are now in the hands of local leaders.

The CDC reported it would no longer requires masks on school buses or vans, however, local boards of education and local leaders can decide on masks wearing in schools and buses, depending on the conditions in their localities. The different sources of authority in consultation with their minimalities can decide on mask wearing.

VII. Superintendent's Report • Updates – Dr. Iline Tracey	Dr. Tracey reported on Winter Fund camp, coordinated by Ms. Gemma Joseph was a success. Eight hundred application were received with 200 was accepted. As a result, a spring intercession camp is being planned.
• Literacy Update – Ms. Lynn Brantley •	Formative and summative data assessments - Benchmark Assessment Systems used in the schools to measure the level of proficiency obtained at the end of an instructional unit. This guides daily work and we use assessments to listen to students read. We listen for their point of difficulty and focus to teach and analyze \ those areas. We also have sections on fluency and comprehension. and then we have summative data. 52% is the average score and 50.8% of the students participating in this were deemed proficient.
Discipline Update - Dr. Michele Sherban	School Discipline Sanctions Reviewed our core values about equitable opportunities, high expectations, a culture of continuous improvement Focused on the strategic plans Period covered August 30 -January 31st. School suspensions reduced from 258 down to 56 out of school. Suspensions were reduced from 907 to 755 during this period. Difficult categories were studied to gather disciplinary data e.g. English learner status versus special learner status. Expulsion were also categorized by ethnicity and schools. There were decreases and increases in suspension and expulsions in different schools at different periods.
	Grade distribution focused on grades 5 through 8 report cards. This represent the number of grades for marking period 1 which was compared to marking period 2.
	Focus was on students passing with 92% of students passing with a C or better. There was a variation on grades in different schools. There was also overall increases and failure in some schools. High schools making periods issues grades 3 and sometimes 4 times per year. A larger % of grades fell to not passing in high schools. Failing grade varies across the different subject areas from low of 11%. high of 13% in mathematics.
