- 3. Improve access and quality of programming for STEM, world languages, arts, science, music, and social studies through instructional support, technology integration, supplies, and improved curricula.

Well-Rounded Education

- College-before-college students at Gateway and SCSU were provided with texts for classes.
- Advanced placement testing will be provided for all students districtwide (488). AP Coordinators were supported by a PT district coordinator and schools by AP coordinators.
- AP teachers in need of training attended online courses in the summer of 2023.
- All high schools were able to offer the Seal of Biliteracy testing to students and 160 students have passed so far.
- New and struggling world language teachers were given more than 60 hours of assistance by the WL PT Coaches (so far).
- College bus trips were taken by Coop, HSC, MBA, and Sound (so far).
- Internship coordinators developed districtwide internship programs are providing coordinating services to students.
- CNA exams for students at Wilbur Cross will be paid for in the spring of 2024.

Safe & Healthy

- During the 23-24 school year, teacher and administrators used the Global Interpreters Network
 phone-in translation service to reach out to families in their languages for 5,743 minutes so far
 this year.
- A RFP process chose a new Climate Survey company CustomInsight, and plans are in place to to surveys in spring of 2024.
- A Title IVA intern is assisting the Coordinator to design and implement bullying prevention programs.
- Student health needs were tracked and data analyzed with an online platform.

- Health Curriculum materials across various grades for students and families were translated into Spanish.
- Students accessed anti-bullying modules through the Safe Schools platform.

Technology

- Teachers used Kami, Pear Deck, Screencastify, and Padlet to enhance instruction at every level.
- 200+ teachers used Quizlet to provide online study flashcards for students.
- Multilingual learner teachers and WL teachers used Gimkit to engage students in vocabulary study.
- Computer-based engineering, design, and 3D modeling, printing, and animation classes are using OnShape district license. It allows students to collaborate online and access their work remotely.

This application addresses the NHPS goal areas of <u>academic achievement</u> by improving the instruction of science, mathematics, social studies, performing arts and world languages with curriculum writing, professional development, and both online and print instructional resources for these areas.

This application addresses the NHPS goal areas of <u>academic achievement and chronic absenteeism</u> by addressing districtwide bullying prevention, student civic involvement, and increased parent involvement. It also seeks to improve chronic absenteeism by providing targeted health and behavioral services, materials, and tracking. It specifically addresses the needs of at-risk middle school students at the schools identified as most in need.

Finally, the grant addresses the NextGen Accountability measure of <u>college and career readiness</u> through establishment of College and Career Centers at James Hillhouse HS, Wilbur Cross HS, High School in the Community, and Cooperative Arts & Humanities. Districtwide, it promotes the AP program, College before College courses, the Seal of Biliteracy, internships for students, college tours for students, and credit recovery.

2. Please explain why this proposal is significant and important in relation to improving student and/or staff performance, as well as any additional pertinent information that is specific and relevant: (Include resume of person(s) providing service for contracts \$10,000 and over)

Many aspects of this grant relate directly to the improvement of student performance. It includes funds to create better-aligned, engaging, and culturally responsive curriculum and assessments. It provides professional development to improve instruction with technology. It expands or enhances programs that relate directly to student engagement in school, such as the updating curriculum, enhancing instruction with digital content, and the Seal of Biliteracy for students who learn or already speak world languages. The safe and healthy section of this grant also impacts student performance by addressing their physical and social-emotional needs. Greater parent engagement through the Climate Survey, and available translation in 200+ languages also has the potential to effect on student performance in school.

This grant will lead to improved staff performance via professional development and/or curriculum writing in science, social studies, performing arts, and world languages. It includes technology tools that enable teachers to provide engaging instruction in more efficient ways, and with the support of online training videos and assistance.
